ABOUT PARNASSUS & OUR SCHOOL OF RHETORIC

Parnassus Preparatory School is a public, tuition-free, K-12, classical charter school serving a diverse body of students in the northwest suburbs of the Twin Cities. Our School of Rhetoric serves students in grades 9-12 and prepares them to pursue their intellectual passions at the university level.

The mission of Parnassus Preparatory School is to provide students with a classical education, grounded in the classical Trivium, that demands their best in intellectual achievement and character development.

Parnassus' School of Rhetoric offers a rigorous, liberal arts education, grounded in the tools of rhetoric and inquiry. Our program focuses on:

- Socratic Method and questioning techniques across all subjects
- Harkness model of discussion-based learning in the humanities
- Emphasis on public speaking, including five years of required oratorical competition
- Liberal arts program encompassing the fundamentals of the arts, sciences, and humanities

HALLMARKS OF A PARNASSUS GRADUATE

We agree with Plato's assertion that the highest goal of education is to become good, both intellectually and morally, and to have high standards and expectations for our students. At Parnassus:

- All graduates write, edit, present, and defend a 20-25 page academic paper as part of the senior thesis.
- Over 90% of the class of 2024 has completed at least one course at the Advanced Placement or University of Minnesota College in the Schools level.
- Students develop a high level of personal and academic discipline to prepare for the rigor and workload of college and adult life.

Students engage with challenging, influential texts. Parnassus students:

- Read from original sources in history, dating back to Herodotus
- Read and discuss at least 40 unabridged books, including the Iliad and the Odyssey, the Epic of Gilgamesh, Don Quixote, The Brothers Karamazov, The Republic, and Pride and Prejudice over their four years of study
- In mathematics and science courses, read and analyze a wide body of empirical studies, journal
 articles, and commentary to spark discussion and debate
- Study at least eight of Shakespeare's complete plays in depth and in the original language, including *Hamlet, The Merchant of Venice, Macbeth, Richard III*, and *Twelfth Night*

Students are challenged in a language-focused program. In our world and classical language courses:

- Attention is devoted to mastery of the underlying structure of the language, including grammar, syntax, and vocabulary, as well as reading from primary sources in the original language
- A minimum of 7 years of daily instruction in Latin is required, beginning in third grade
- At least one year of college-level Classical Greek is required in the upper school
- A minimum of 11 years of daily instruction in Spanish is required, beginning in kindergarten

Note: At many other schools, Latin has become a course for students who are "not good" at the study of foreign languages – ignoring the systematic study of grammar in favor of parties, food, movies, and cultural activities. This is *not* the case at Parnassus.

Diploma Requirements

Classical Diploma:

The Parnassus Classical Diploma requires additional coursework in the classical languages (Latin and/or Greek), sciences, and mathematics and reflects the school's most challenging and rigorous course of study. The Classical Diploma requires 29 credit units:

Latin & Greek: 4 Credits English Literature:4 Credits

History: 4 Credits Science: 4 Credits Math: 4 Credits Spanish: 2 Credits Fine Arts: 1 Credit PE/Health: 1 Credit Electives: 3 Credits Rhetoric: 1 ½ Credits

Fourth Level Rhetoric/4R (12th Grade) Thesis: ½ Credit; Awarded after successful defense of thesis

Standard Diploma:

The standard Parnassus diploma requires 25 credit units:

Latin & Greek: 2 Credits English Literature: 4 Credits

History: 4 Credits Science: 3 Credits Math: 3 Credits Spanish: 2 Credits Fine Arts: 1 Credit PE/Health: 1 Credit Electives: 3 Credits Rhetoric: 1 ½ Credits

Fourth Level Rhetoric/4R Thesis: ½ Credit; Awarded after successful defense of thesis

These requirements represent the minimum number of credits required to graduate from Parnassus. To build the strongest academic foundation in preparation for applying to selective colleges, it is strongly recommended that scholars go beyond the graduation requirements in core academic disciplines through their Fourth Level Rhetoric (senior) year.

Thesis Requirement

All 4R (senior) students are required to participate in the thesis program, which includes the writing, presentation, and defense of an original argument. The thesis is a year-long paper of 20 - 25 pages, completed in addition to the normal course load. Scholars must complete a thesis defense, a public presentation, and an oral examination with a faculty panel. In addition to receiving credit towards graduation, students who excel in the presentation and defense are awarded Latin honors in the thesis.

COLLEGE-PREPARATORY CURRICULUM

School of Rhetoric students have the opportunity to take many honors-level courses, college courses through the University of Minnesota (CIS), and Advanced Placement (AP) courses.

Reading Period

As a rigorous, college preparatory school, Parnassus students are expected to keep up with a substantial workload for their courses. To support students in their academic endeavors, all Parnassus School of Rhetoric scholars have a Reading Period on Wednesday afternoons, a time designated for quiet study, reading, and meeting with faculty. This is not a study hall and is not taken in place of a credit-bearing course.

Honors Courses

Parnassus honors-level courses are similar in rigor to college-level courses. Students must have a minimum of a 3.5 GPA and be recommended by the instructor. Throughout their four-year plan of study, students have the option of taking the following required courses with honors distinction:

GRADING SYSTEM

To better meet the needs of scholars, Parnassus offers courses at different levels, although all levels are rigorous and challenging. Grades are weighted according to the level of study.

College Preparatory Level (4.0 scale)

GRK 712 Intermediate Classical Greek

Parnassus' standard courses move at a challenging pace with the level of difficulty and depth that will prepare students for study at the university level.

Honors, University of Minnesota College in Schools (CIS), and AP Level (4.5 scale)

Courses that are offered at this level include content and workload expectations at an even higher level of difficulty than our standard course of study. These courses receive the honors designation on the transcript and are graded on a weighted scale.

CLASS RANK

Parnassus does not rank students; however, at graduation, scholars may be awarded Latin honors in course or thesis, which provides a better measurement of the students' academic standing.
